On 22 June 2018, you emailed the Ministry requesting, under the Official Information Act 1982, the following information:

- 1. The amount the Ministry has spent on the Training Incentive Allowance (TIA) for the past five years in the Northland region
- 2. The number of applications there has been for the TIA, and how many of these were granted.

Please find enclosed the following four tables:

- Table One shows the amount paid for the TIA as a supplementary allowance for on-going costs and lump sum payments for each financial year from 2012/13 to 2016/17, for New Zealand and the Northland region.
- Table Two shows the amount granted for TIA through Special Needs Grants for each calendar year from 2013 to 2017, for New Zealand and the Northland region.
- Table Three shows the number of applications for weekly TIA supplementary allowance for each calendar year from 2013 to 2017, for New Zealand and the Northland region.
- Table Four shows the number of applications for TIA through Special Needs Grants for each calendar year from 2013 to 2017, for New Zealand and the Northland region.

Please note that due to the ad hoc nature of lump sum TIA payments the Ministry is not able to capture every instance of the TIA being applied for and declined in the reporting system. As such, the data in Table Three provides an idea of the trends in the data but is not a robust representation of the total number of applicants.

You will note that some of the data is suppressed under section 9(2)(a) of the Act in order to protect the privacy of natural persons. The need to protect the privacy of these individuals outweighs any public interest in this information.

The principles and purposes of the Official Information Act 1982 under which you made your request are:

- to create greater openness and transparency about the plans, work and activities of the Government,
- to increase the ability of the public to participate in the making and administration of our laws and policies and
- · to lead to greater accountability in the conduct of public affairs.

This Ministry fully supports those principles and purposes. The Ministry therefore intends to make the information contained in this letter available to the wider public shortly. The Ministry will do this by publishing this letter on the Ministry of Social Development's website. Your personal details will be deleted and the Ministry will not publish any information that would identify you as the person who requested the information.
