On 20 August 2018, you emailed the Ministry requesting, under the Official Information Act 1982, the following information:

- What are the current guidelines or method used by Work in Income case workers to decide the amount received by beneficiaries for food grants.
- Specific research or studies used to create the guidelines and methods by which Work and Income decides how much a beneficiary receives for food grants.
- 3. Number of food grants granted in the last quarter of 2018 and a breakdown by Work and Income offices.

When someone asks Work and Income for assistance to purchase food, the Case Manager will work with the individual to understand their immediate need and what circumstances have led to their request. The Case Manager and the individual will work together to determine how much assistance is required to buy food until the individual's next income payment is due.

When determining the amount granted for a Special Needs Grant (SNG) for food, the following factors are taken into consideration:

- · is it reasonable and fair?
- is the decision justified and lawful?
- · when is their next benefit payment?
- what is the usual amount spent on food?
- is the food amount reasonable based on their family size?

When entering a hardship assistance application the Case Manager is prompted with the following questions:

- Has the client taken reasonable steps to improve their financial circumstances?
- Has Temporary Additional Support been assessed for this client?
- What is the partner's gross weekly income?
- What cash assets does the partner have?
- What is the client's gross weekly income?
- · What cash assets does the client have?

- How many dependent children does the client have?
- Is the client unable to buy food because they have spent money on an essential expense that had to be met?
- Can the need be met in another way?
- Is there an immediate essential need?
- Has the client's need been established?
- How much was the essential expense that the client used money for?

Your request for information on specific research or studies used to create the guidelines and methods by which Work and Income decides how much a client receives for food grants is refused under section 18(e) of the Official Information Act (the Act) as this information does not exist or, despite reasonable efforts to locate it, cannot be found. However, the Food Cost Survey provides the Ministry with useful information about the weekly food costs of households and provides guidance to make informed decisions when determining the amount granted for a SNG for food.

Information in the Food Cost Survey has previously been used to inform policy changes which provide additional financial assistance to low-to-middle income households, such as the 2016 Child Material Hardship package.
