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On 25 July 2018 you emailed the Ministry requesting, under the Official Information Act 1982, the following Information:

- How many people are on "welfare" due to mental health reasons?
- The costs associated with this, including any supplementary support.

Supported Living Payment is a benefit for people who have, or who are caring for someone with, a health condition, injury or disability that severely limits their ability to work on a long-term basis. Further information about Supported Living Payment is available from the Work and Income website here: www.workandincome.govt.nz/products/a-z-benefits/supported-living-payment.html.

Jobseeker Support is a benefit for people who are not in employment and are looking for work, in part-time employment seeking more work, or have a health condition or disability which affects their ability to work and means they have to reduce their hours or stop work for a while. Further information about Jobseeker Support is available from the Work and Income website here: www.workandincome.govt.nz/products/a-z-benefits/jobseeker-support.html.

Table 1 enclosed shows the number of people in receipt of Jobseeker Support — Health Condition, Injury or Disability as at the end of each quarter, and those in receipt of the Supported Living Payment, where the individual's primary incapacity is recorded as 'Psychological or Psychiatric Condition'. The table also shows quarterly snapshots of the total weekly net amount that the Ministry pays for these benefits. The Supported Living Payment and Jobseeker Support Health Condition, Injury or Disability payment are made in order to assist individuals in covering their living costs, not the costs of mental health treatment.

Please note that the group of conditions classified as 'Psychological or Psychiatric Condition' vary significantly, including stress, depression, bipolar disorder, schizophrenia and more.

In addition to the above supports for clients with mental health conditions, the Ministry may also provide the Disability Allowance to individuals where their conditions result in on-going costs. Please note that this is only payable where the costs are not fully covered by another agency, and therefore does not apply where the costs of mental health treatment are covered by the Ministry of Health or a District Health Board. Further information regarding the Disability Allowance is available on the Ministry's website here: www.workandincome.govt.nz/products/a-z-benefits/disability-allowance.html.

The Ministry records Disability Allowance claims by reason, two of which may be associated with mental health: 'Counselling' and 'Counselling – transport'. Tables 2 and 3 attached show the number of costs claimed and weekly amount claimed for 'counselling' and 'counselling – transport' in Disability Allowance broken down by end of financial quarter from September 2013 to June 2018. Please note, this is the amount claimed and not necessarily the amount paid.

Where clients have an immediate and essential need for which they require financial assistance, the Ministry may provide hardship assistance in the form of a lump sum payment. These payments include recoverable and non-recoverable Special Needs Grants, Recoverable Assistance Programme payments, advance payments of main benefits. A list of the payments and benefits available can be found at: www.workandincome.govt.nz/products/a-z-benefits/index.html.

Information regarding the number of hardship assistance payments which were made for mental health treatment and related costs, and the value of these payments, is held on individual case files. In order to provide you with this information Ministry staff would have to manually review thousands of files. As such, this part of your request is refused under section 18(f) of the Official Information Act. The greater public interest is in the effective and efficient administration of the public service. Please note that where these payments occur they primarily relate to transport and other associated costs as the costs of treatment itself are funded by the Ministry of Health.

I have considered whether the Ministry would be able to respond to your request given extra time, or the ability to charge for the information requested. I have concluded that, in either case, the Ministry's ability to undertake its work would still be prejudiced.

The principles and purposes of the Official Information Act 1982 under which you made your request are:

- to create greater openness and transparency about the plans, work and activities of the Government,
- to increase the ability of the public to participate in the making and administration of our laws and policies and
- to lead to greater accountability in the conduct of public affairs.

This Ministry fully supports those principles and purposes. The Ministry therefore intends to make the information contained in this letter and any attached documents available to the wider public shortly. The Ministry will do this by publishing this letter and attachments on the Ministry of Social Development's website. Your personal details will be deleted and the Ministry will not publish any information that would identify you as the person who requested the information.
